1. Brief History of the Nagaland Board of School Education

The Board was instituted by the Nagaland Act No 4 named the 'Nagaland Board of School Education Act 1973' of the Nagaland State Legislative Assembly 1973 after the assent was received from the Governor on the 15th November 1973: an expression of the then leaders of the State and the Governor of their aspiration to develop and promote the educational system in Nagaland. This Act empowered the Board to prescribe, regulate, supervise and develop the educational system of the State for the Secondary and Higher Secondary levels.

The Board started functioning from the 1st October 1974 under the administrative supervision of the Secretary of the Board. In March 1975, the Board held its first High School Leaving Certificate (HSLC) Examination at 6 Centres for 2008 candidates of various categories. The Board adopted and adapted the curriculum and syllabus of the Assam Board of Secondary Education, Guwahati, under which the schools in Nagaland were affiliated with since 1948. With this, the Board saw the need to focus on setting up its own identity and deputed a batch of 29 teachers and Headmasters to the National Council of Educational Research and Training, New Delhi in March 1976 for short-course training in paper-setting and evaluation. Further, workshops on Examination Reforms and Work Experience were conducted at Kohima in September and October 1976 in collaboration with NCERT, Delhi and Regional Institute of Education, Bhubaneswar. This exercise of short course trainings and study tours was done mainly as capacity building measures so as to emerge with its own identity. These activities still constitute an integral part of the Board's pursuit of keeping pace with the fast changing world.

The Board is an active member of the Council of Boards of School Education (COBSE) in India. The Board officials attend the COBSE meetings and Annual Conferences to learn about the latest educational development and the implementation of new policy and schemes. Though small in terms of size and number, the NBSE has now emerged as a prominent Board in the country. At present, the Chairman of NBSE is the President of COBSE (2017 - till date).

A State-level committee was set up for development of Curriculum and the first meeting was held on 30th March 1978. With this, a series of deliberation on the construction of curriculum and workshops to develop a curriculum that suits the needs of the local environment were conducted.

The new curriculum was approved by the Government of Nagaland on the 12th April 1979. The textbooks based on the curriculum framed by experts was introduced in Class IX and X in 1981 and 1982 respectively.

In October 1981 and April 1982, the Board, seeing the need to train teachers and Headmasters, conducted more workshops on setting of questions and preparation of model answers in collaboration with Nagaland College of Education and the State Council of Educational Research and Training. The Board continued to depute its officers to other Boards time and again in 1984 to 1986 to West Bengal, Tura, Guwahati, Agartala, Aizawl and Imphal to study the establishment and examination matters.

The Board conducted the HSLC Examination based on the new syllabus/ curriculum in March 1983 for 2547 candidates. Examination for the old course continued upto 3 times till December1984 for the failed candidates of the old course. The first Elementary School Leaving (ESL) Examination for class VIII was conducted by the Board in November 1986 at 45 Centres in 6 papers on 4 subjects for 6952 students. However, the examination was

decentralized from the following year due to insufficient infrastructure of the Board. In 1984 centrally coded answer-books were issued to the examiners for the first time along with centralised evaluation done in Kohima for the first time.

In 1988, the existing HSLC Course was bifurcated to two semester examinations, that is, at the end of Class IX and X (HSLC). Consequently the Class IX examination was conducted in that same year at 104 recognised schools for 7193 students. Evaluation and publication of results were decentralized by using model answers and passing criteria of the Board. The HSLC Examination of 1988 was held in February 1989 with the newly bifurcated syllabus in which 8302 candidates appeared. The syllabus was based on the National core curriculum.

In 1990 the Board was empowered to conduct Higher Secondary School Leaving Certificate (HSSLC) Examinations in three streams- Arts, Commerce and Science by an amendment of the Act. The amendment was followed by up-gradation of four Government High Schools of Dimapur, Mon, Tuensang and Phek to Higher Secondary level in 1993. The first HSSLC examination was conducted in 1995 along with the Nagaland University, conducting its own Pre-University exams. However in 2000, the Higher Secondary level examination was academically completely delinked from the University and brought under the Board. The first HSSLC Examination after it was delinked from the University, was conducted in 2002 at 17 (seventeen) Centres for 4171 candidates.

The conduct of examinations has undergone several reforms and one significant development in the recent years was the introduction of centrally coded answer scripts for centralized evaluation. In 1994, the Board allotted students' registration numbers and in 1995 the students were issued Pass Certificates with registration numbers for better authentication and for better maintenance of Board records.

The Boards' examination processes were fully computerized by 1997 and all documents/ certificates were issued in printed form through an in-house-process. This system was upgraded in 2004 with the introduction of the Intelligent Character Recognition (ICR) system through a project funded by the North Eastern Council (NEC). This system eliminates manual data entry and it uses scanning and recognition software which is more efficient, thereby improving the working system.

In addition to the conduct of examinations for its prescribed courses of studies, the Board conducted the National Talent Search Examination (NTSE) at the State Level for the students of Class X since 1985 to 2008. The Board, on the request of the Government of Nagaland, has also been satisfactorily conducting the Joint Entrance Examination (JEE) from 1994 for selection of students to go for higher studies in various technical courses under the state quota till 2013. In 2014, the state was again requested to conduct the State Pre-Medical Test. From 2015, the Board has been conducting the Nagaland State Entrance Examination (NSEE) for Agriculture and allied courses.

To commemorate the International Year of Women the University Grants Commission made it mandatory for all educational institutions to include the mother's name in every document of the pupil in 2014. The NBSE adopted and implemented this directive and can be considered as one of the first in the country to do so.

The Board has re-enforced the use of Cumulative Record cum Schooling History (CRSH) [*now renamed as Pupil Cumulative Record (PCR)*] from Classes 1 (one) to 12 (twelve) in 2000 (earlier it was from Class 5) to ensure a continuous and comprehensive monitoring of the students. This has strengthened the monitoring of enrolment, retention and progress of the students and has at the same time, streamlined the records.

The Board organizes meeting with the Superintendents of Examination centres as an annual activity. The NBSE is also among the few Boards that gives feedback to the schools and takes stock of school-wise performance to assess the strength and valuable areas of each school. It is the endeavour of the Board to bring about required changes in the educational system which is constantly growing and changing.

At the national level, the NBSE was one of the first state Boards in the country to have introduced grading in declaring its results for HSLC. It is also one of the first Boards in the country to have introduced the testing of the four skills in English language i.e. Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing at Secondary and Higher Secondary levels in 2007.

The Board is making sincere efforts in every aspect to provide quality education and to accurately assess the learning outcome of the students. From a humble beginning, through ups and downs, trials and errors, overcoming various challenges, the Board has brought the educational system of the State at par with the rest of the country, and still envisages to attain a higher degree of excellence.

2. STRUCTURE OF NBSE

The Nagaland Board of School Education (NBSE) office is located in Kohima, at Upper Bayavu Hill. It is the only office from which the Board operates. The office started functioning in this location since 1974 and continues to function in the same location till date. As of September 2023, there are 97 staff members working in the Board office.

The Governing Body is the apex advisory body of the Board empowered by the Nagaland Board of School Education Act, 1973 to take decisions for the Board's office.

The Governing Body of the Board consist of the following members, namely:-

 - (iii) One District Education Officer to be nominated by the Director of School Education.
- (d) Co-opted Members.

The Board shall have powers to co-opt not more than two members from amongst the distinguished educationists.

The Secretary of the Board shall be the Member Secretary of the Governing Body of the Board.

Key branches and their Functions

The Chairperson is the Chief Executive Officer or the Executive head of the Board; and the Secretary, NBSE is the Principal Administrative Officer.

a. Academic: All academic activities pertaining to the Board are headed by the Joint Secretary, and are assisted by the Sr. Academic Officer, Academic Officer, Asst. Academic Officer and Junior Academic Officer. It is responsible for all matters concerning development of the curriculum and syllabus for all the subjects at the Secondary and Higher Secondary and planning, management, supervision, and coordination of academic activities.

b. Examination: It is responsible for all matters concerning examinations and administration of examinations, the major areas being pre and post examination work, coordination for conducting public examinations such as HSLC and HSSLC, Compartmental examinations and decentralised examinations (class VIII, IX and XI). The branch is headed by the Controller of Examinations, and is assisted by the Deputy Controller of Examinations, to manage and coordinate the activities of the examinations. The team also includes Assistant Secretary, who is assigned with supervision and management responsibilities; and the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent who assist in the management of the branch.

c. Information Technology: This department is responsible for programming and management of the IT cell. It deals mostly with Pre and Post examination processes. The cell is currently headed by the Chief Coordinator and assisted by Sr. IT Officer/Assistant IT Officer in the team and the assistants.

d. Establishment: The Establishment section deals with all administrative and establishment matters and is headed by the Assistant Secretary, Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent. While the Assistant Secretary supervises and manages the assigned branch, the Superintendent looks into the management of the branch with the assistants.

e. Accounts: The accounts section is responsible for supervision and monitoring of funds and planning, budgeting, and maintenance of records, which is headed by Assistant Secretary (Accounts) and a Junior Accounts officer.

3. ACTIVITIES AND INITIATIVES OF THE BOARD

I. ACADEMIC

The NBSE looks after all aspects of academic and examination matters from Secondary till Higher Secondary level and also monitor the activities of its registered schools. The Board continues to put all efforts to make the curriculum meaningful to cater to the diverse needs of all students.

a. Affiliation/Registration of schools:

The NBSE grants permission and registers schools within the State to start Classes IX to XII. It also accords recognition to the private institutions. Permission and Recognition is granted after inspection and on fulfilment of the Board's criteria.

b. Curriculum, Syllabus and Textbooks:

Development of curriculum and syllabus and textbooks for Secondary up to Higher Secondary level are carried out by the Board.

The existing curriculum and syllabus being introduced from the academic year 2007 is based on the National Curriculum Framework (NCF) 2005. It is made relevant and in tune with the local needs.

The present course of study at Secondary and Higher Secondary was revised on the guiding principles of National Curriculum Framework (NCF) 2005 and introduced in Class IX & XI in 2015 academic session and for Class X & XII, it was made effective in 2016 academic session respectively.

The Core Syllabus for Science and Commerce Stream for the whole country which was framed by Council of Boards of School Education in India (COBSE) and National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) was implemented by the Board with effect from the academic session 2011.

The Board has adopted the NCERT textbooks for Secondary Science and Mathematics subjects, and all science subjects of Higher Secondary level in 2017-2018.

Vocational Subjects: Students, irrespective of stream, can opt for any one vocational subject as an elective subject. i.e. Information Technology Enabled Services, Tourism & Hospitality, Retail, Beauty & Wellness, Electronics, Agriculture, Automotive, Health Care.

c. Vocational Education:

The state of Nagaland under the banner of RMSA started implementing the Centrally Sponsored Scheme of Vocationalization of Secondary and Higher Secondary School Education in 5 (five) selected Government Higher Secondary Schools in a phase manner from Class IX from 2014 onward with Information Technology and Travel & Tourism based on National Vocational Education Qualification Framework (NVEQF). Vocational subjects are skill based and certification is jointly done by the Board, National Skill Development Council, and the Sector Skill Councils/Industry.

Currently, under the Samagra Shiksha there are 97 Government Schools being covered under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme of Vocationalization of School Education.

In keeping with the goal of the NEP 2020 to reach out to 50% of the student community to have exposure to Vocational Education, the NBSE allowed private schools to introduce vocational education from 2022 onwards. Presently, there are 159 private schools with vocational education in 2023 academic session. This initiative of allowing the private schools to introduce vocational education is one of the first in the country.

The Board has mainstreamed vocational education by introducing vocational education as an optional subject in the secondary stage and as elective subject in the higher secondary stage. Vocational subject as an optional subject can replace one of the failed subject except English to be eligible for the next higher class at the secondary stage. Till 2021-2022, about 2561 and 940 students have been certified for class X and XII respectively. Certification is done jointly by the respective Sector Skill Council and the Board. About 500 students of class XI & XII have completed 80 hours internship under Samagra Shiksha with the help of the Vocational Training Partners.

At present the Board has introduced 10 (ten) skill based vocational subjects at Secondary and Higher Secondary level. They are; Information Technology Enabled Services, Tourism & Hospitality, Retail, Beauty & Wellness, Electronics, Agriculture, Automotive, Health Care, Plumbing, and Multi Skill Foundation Course.

d. Financial Literacy Programme:

The Board introduced the Financial Management Courses - Financial Markets, Mutual Funds, Capital Markets and Derivative Markets - in collaboration with the National Stock Exchange of India Limited (NSE) at Higher Secondary level in 2014.

The Board also felt the need to create awareness and inculcate knowledge about financial literacy to the students from a young age. The objective is to help the students acquire necessary life skills and prepare them with the basics of financial management and discipline. In this regard, Financial Literacy was introduced in 2016 in collaboration with the National Stock Exchange of India Limited (NSE) on a pilot basis in 60 selected schools of Kohima, Mokokchung and Dimapur. Thereafter, Financial Literacy course was made compulsory to the students of class IX for all the higher secondary schools across the state of Nagaland from the academic session 2017 and subsequently class X in the academic session 2018.

Financial Literacy (FL) Course was made compulsory to all the students in Class IX for all the schools across the State of Nagaland from the academic year 2023 and Class X from the next academic session 2024.

NSE (now NSE Academy) conducts training for the FL subject teachers every year in the month of February or March for the newly upgraded schools and new teachers. At the end of each academic year, the NSE Academy conducts an online examination called National Stock Exchange Certificate for Financial Management (NCFM).For FMM, a joint Certificate is issued to all the HSSLC candidates who qualified in both the HSSLC Examination conducted by NBSE and the NCFM examination of both Class XI and XII.

The curriculum comprise of 25 periods for an academic session. At the end of each academic session (usually in the month of August) an offline/online examination (objective type) is conducted.

For Financial Literacy, joint certificates by the NBSE and NSE Academy are issued on various categories such as Pass Certificate to all the qualified candidates, Participation Certificates to all unqualified candidates who appeared the exam, Merit Certificates to all the top scorer of the school on the condition that the mark is above 90 and Certificate of Appreciation to the subject teacher where the school achieve 100 pass percentage.

e. Rationalised Syllabus:

As per the recommendation of the National Education Policy 2020 on reducing the content load and providing opportunities for experiential learning with a creative mindset, the Board has rationalised the syllabus in the core subjects of Social Sciences, Mathematics & Science for Secondary level. For Higher Secondary, Political Sciences, History, Sociology, Economics, Psychology, Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Biology, Accountancy & Business studies subjects were rationalised. These subjects were rationalised in line with NCERT rationalised syllabus and came into effect from the academic session 2022.

f. Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE):

The Board introduced the Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) scheme at the secondary stage in all its registered schools in the year 2007. CCE refers to a system of evaluation that covers all aspects of students' development. The term "continuous" refers to evaluation of all aspects of students' growth and development that covers the teaching – learning process of the entire academic session. The second term "comprehensive" means the assessment cover both the scholastic and the co-scholastic aspects of students' growth and development.

The CCE scheme was revised in 2015 to facilitate holistic assessment of the child with the techniques and tools of evaluation. A report card on CCE was also developed by the Board and introduced in 2016 to record the overall performance of the students.

g. Grading:

In view of the resolution adopted by the COBSE to introduce grading system, the Board started taking necessary steps for introducing this system. The first phase of training was conducted in the month of May 2006. 202 (two hundred two) teachers from 196 (one hundred ninety-six) institutions from all the districts participated. The Board, then sent 10 (ten) officers from the Board to Kerala, Haryana and Delhi (CBSE) in July-August 2006 to have an on-the-spot study of the grading system adopted by these Boards and their functioning. Subsequently, absolute grading on a 9 point scale for the externally assessed subjects and absolute grading on a 5 point scale for the internally assessed subjects was implemented from 2007 for Class IX as well as for the mid-term examinations of Class X.

Relative grading has been adopted for declaring the results of HSLC Examination.

In 2007, the NBSE became the 3rd State Board in the country to have introduced grading for assessing the performance of the students.

The Board has adopted the Absolute and Relative Grading to assess the performance of its students where the marks are converted into grades since HSLC Examination 2009. **Absolute Grading:** The grading scheme was revised and made effective in 2015 in Class IX. There is no change in the 5(five) point scale for the internally assessed subjects.

- vi) collection and evaluation of statistics, analysis of results
- vii) in-service teachers training

II. EXAMINATIONS

a. Centralised Examination:

The HSSLC and HSLC examinations are conducted in recognised schools selected as examination centres at the end of Class XII and Class X respectively. The evaluation is centralised and the results are declared through gazette and internet.

b. Decentralised Examination:

Promotion examinations for Classes VIII (Government schools) IX & XI are held in the registered institutions of the Board. Question papers are supplied to the institutions by the Board, while evaluation and declaration of results are done internally by schools/colleges as per the criteria given by the Board.

Bar-coding of the answer scripts and Optical Mark Recognition (OMR) award sheet was introduced in the HSLC and HSSLC examinations 2016 and 2017 respectively in order to maintain secrecy and minimise error in preparing the results.

The Board conducts the following examinations based on its prescribed curricula and syllabi:

a. HSSLC Examination:

The NBSE Amendment Act 1990 empowered the Board to conduct the HSSLC Examination under three streams — Science, Arts and Commerce. Subsequently, the Government of Nagaland upgraded the Government High Schools of Dimapur, Mon, Tuensang and Phek in 1993 to Higher Secondary stage and the first examination was conducted in 1995 for 44 candidates. In 2023, the HSSLC examination was conducted at 65 centres for 16,083 candidates.

b. Class XI Promotion Examination:

The course of Higher Secondary was bifurcated into two one-year courses from the year the Board took over and examination is being conducted at the end of every year. The first Class XI promotion examination was conducted in 1994. In 2023, the examination was conducted in 183 centres for 22,014 candidates.

c. HSLC Examination:

The first HSLC Examination was conducted in 1975 at 6 centres for 2008 candidates. In 2023, HSLC Examination was conducted at 96 centres across the State for 24,360 candidates.

d. HSLC (Compartmental) Examination:

The Board in its endeavour to help the students to save a year introduced compartmental examination for HSLC failed candidates in the year 2015. A candidate who could not clear the examination and secured "Needs Improvement" grades in 3 or less subjects are eligible to sit for Compartmental Examination.

The Compartmental Examination is conducted in the same year so as to enable the students to pursue their higher studies without losing a year.

With the introduction of Compartmental Examination, the backlog of repeaters has been reduced.

e. Class IX Final Examination:

The Class IX Final Examination was conducted for the first time in 1988 at 103 centres for 7173 candidates after the HSLC course was bifurcated. In 2023, examination was conducted at 724centres for 30,747 candidates.

f. Class VIII Examination: The Board began conducting Class VIII Examination from 2019 again after a hiatus of 11 years. Prior to this, the SCERT had been conducting ESL Examination from 2008. In 2023, examination was conducted at 1109 centres for 28,134 candidates for Government schools.

g. Entrance Examination:

The Board on the request of the Government of Nagaland has been conducting the following entrance examinations for selection of candidates to the state quota for different technical courses since its very inception in 1994 till date -

i.	Joint Entrance Examination (JEE)	: from 1994 to 2012
ii.	Nagaland State Pre Medical Test (NSPMT)	: 2014 & 2015
iii.	Nagaland State Entrance Examination (NSEE)	: 2016 - 2023

EXAMINATIONS REFORMS:

- 1. With the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 emphasising on testing competencies of the students, the Board initiated the following reforms:
 - Revised the existing assessment with more emphasis on testing conceptual, critical thinking skills and core competencies of the students w.e.f. 2023.
 - Introduced **Compartmental Examination for HSSLC candidates** w.e.f. 2023 for those candidates who failed in 3 or less subjects. HSLC Compartmental Examination was introduced in 2015.

- 2 (two) chances are given to candidates to appear compartmental examination in the subsequent examinations in order to reduce and prevent drop-out rate at HSLC and HSSLC Examinations.
- Provision for candidates who qualified at the HSLC Examination but secured Needs Improvement in one subject are given opportunity to reappear in the Needs Improvement subject at the immediate examination so that they can apply for courses, fulfill certain recruitment criteria and employment where they need to pass in all the subjects they have opted.
- In order to facilitate students to improve their grades or marks to pursue higher education with their choice of subjects, provision is given to qualified/passed candidates to appear **Improvement of Performance Examination** in the same year w.e.f. 2023. A successful candidate at the HSLC/HSSLC Examination desirous of improving his/her performance are given one chance in June/July of the same year to appear in three or less subjects. This provision will also help students to have the best of two examination option as envisioned in NEP 2020.
- Special examination for students (HSLC & HSSLC) participating at the State/National/International level games is also introduced if such sporting events coincides with the Board's Examination. This is initiated in order to promote sports among the students.

2. Rules Relating to Students with Disabilities:

The NEP 2020 envisages Equitable and Inclusive Education and reaffirms that bridging social category gaps in access, participation and learning outcomes in school education must be a major goal of all education sector development programmes. It also reaffirms the provisions contained in the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (RPWD) Act 2016. In this regard, NBSE reviewed and made suitable modifications in the curriculum and examination system so as to meet the needs of students with disabilities. Some provisions for rules relating to students with disabilities are as follows:

- a. Exemption of examination fees for candidates with disabilities from classes VIII to XII.
- b. Special arrangement of room (if needed) for the candidate for whom a scribe/reader is allowed.
- c. Scribe (if required) is permitted with the purpose of reading out the questions and then writing down the answers dictated by the candidate only.
- d. Computer/laptop will be allowed with limitations, as per the actual need and skill of the student with disabilities, duly supported by certificate issued by an authorized competent Medical Authority recommending use of computer facility for writing the examination citing the ground on which recommendation had been made.
- e. Candidates with disabilities are allowed compensatory time as follows:
 - For paper of 3 hours duration 60 minutes
 - For paper of 2 hours duration -
 - For paper of $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours duration 30 minutes
- f. Exemptions in subjects and flexibility in choosing subject is provided.
 - Third language exemption in Class VIII.
 - At Secondary level, option to choose English as compulsory and any other 4 subjects from the prescribed course.

• Alternate questions for visually impaired students are included in the existing question papers from class VIII to XII.

g. Launched a **Specific Learning Disability (SLD) chatbot** on NBSE portal on 3rd December 2022, in collaboration with **Changeinkk Foundation**, a non-profit organisation committed to creating pathways of success for neurodiverse individuals from cradle to career, in particular, those with Specific Learning Disabilities (SLDs) by enabling an inclusive ecosystem.

3. Phase I & II Examinations for Class VIII & IX:

Another examination reform is Phase I & II examination for Class VIII (Government schools only) and Class IX introduced in 2021. Similarly, all private schools also conduct Class VIII final examination, in a phase manner and follow the same assessment pattern. The two phase examination was birthed in the backdrop of the COVID -19 Pandemic and as envisaged in NEP 2020 to transform assessment into a more regular and formative assessment.

4. Mathematics A & B Examination:

The Board has introduced two levels of mathematics question papers for HSLC examination 2024. As per the recommendations of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, this system was introduced so that all learners will achieve their potential ability and thereby reduce examination pressure. Known as Mathematics A and B, the former will be of higher standard and equivalent to the existing one while the latter will be of relatively lower difficulty level.

III. CONDUCT OF EXAMINATIONS

2.

The examinations conducted by the Board can be categorised into two different scheme:

- 1. School based Board Examination Classes VIII, IX & XI
 - Public Examination HSSLC & HSLC

In school based Board examination, the Board sets the question papers and schools download OTP generated protected password question paper from the portal. Evaluation of answer scripts is done by the centres/schools and the results are declared after the approval of the Board. All registered institutions are centres of examination.

In public examination, the Board sets question papers, appoint experienced teachers to evaluate the answer scripts and declares the results. The Board creates the centres of examination all over the State depending on the number of enrolment and schools, administrative convenience and availability of Government Treasury or Nationalised Banks and Postal Services.

a. Paper Setting:

Only experienced teachers who teach the subjects are appointed as question paper setters. In each subject, the setters prepare the question papers based on the design given by the Board. It is then moderated by a team of moderators drawn from the subject teachers/experts. The question setters and moderators also prepare the scoring key/marking scheme for each subject.

b. Evaluation:

In order to maintain secrecy and accuracy in evaluation process, the Board introduced the use of Optical Mark Reader (OMR) and Bar Code for the entry of Roll numbers in the front cover of the answer scripts with effect from HSLC & HSSLC Examinations 2016. The answer scripts are scanned by an automated scanner and coded and serialised for distribution to the examiners. Evaluation of answer scripts is centralised and done by experienced subject teachers appointed by the Board.

Evaluation work is followed by the head/chief examiner who goes through each and every script of the 1st examiner to see that there is no mistake or error. In case of detection of any mistake or error, it is corrected by the head/chief examiner(s). After completion of these stages — evaluation, scrutiny/head examining, the scripts/award list are scanned for result tabulation.

c. Preparation and declaration of results:

The whole process of result preparation is computerised and is done in-house. Results of HSSLC & HSLC Examinations are declared together within 50-60 days from the date of conduct of examinations. The results are published through Board's portal and other websites. SMS facility is also provided to the students. Provision of downloading the Marksheet is made available. Marksheet-cumcertificates/Marksheets and Pass Certificates are given out to the schools/centres after the results are declared.

d. Re-scrutiny and Photocopy of answer scripts:

The Board has also made provision for re-scrutiny of answer script and showing of photocopy of answer scripts to the candidates with effect from HSLC and HSSLC Examinations 2015.

IV. IT SECTION - Activities and Initiatives

- In 1996, the Board started computerisation of examination process, computer was installed in the NBSE office in the year 1996 for examination processing works. Pre-examination processing for the first batch of class 10 students was done in 1996. And post examination processing of the same batch was done in 1997. Processing of data for class 12 students was integrated in the year 1998.
- 2. The NBSE is one of the first Boards in the North-East which started complete inhouse processing of the examination works.
- 3. The system was further upgraded in 2004 with the introduction of Intelligent Character Recognition (ICR). Using high speed scanners, image/photograph of the students are scanned and printed in Admit Card instead of pasting passport photograph.
- 4. The Board started Web publishing of results in 2001.
- 5. In 2012, the Board launched its website www.nbsenagaland.com
- 6. In 2017, an offline software to be used by all registered schools for data collection was developed and distributed to the schools.
- 7. From 2020, The Board started its own portal <u>www.nbsenl.edu.in</u> and has gone paperless in:
 - a) Communicating to its registered schools through e-copies.
 - b) Submission of forms/application/data, etc. by the registered schools.
 - c) Submission of application forms for HSLC/HSSLC examination by students.
 - d) Online application for re-scrutiny, Compartmental & Improvement examination.
 - e) Submission of fees and other payments.
 - f) Helpdesk for enquiry.
 - g) Downloading Provisional Marksheets and verification for both HSLC & HSSLC for the years 2021 2023.
 - h) Online payment facilities for schools & students. Schools collect fees from students & make payment in the portal for the following :
 - Migration fee
 - Examination fee(Classes 8-12)
 - Financial Literacy fee
 - Annual School registration fee
 - Class VIII & XI Student Registration fee
 - For NSEE candidates whose applications are accepted in DTE, NSEE Fee payment, Admission Card, challenge of marks and result/merit list are made available in the portal.
 - In the conduct of NSEE, the Board collects examination fee & issue admit card through the NBSE portal.
- 8. DigiLocker is a repository of digitised documents. It is a flagship initiative of the Ministry of Electronics &IT(MEITY) and the NBSE. The Board started the use of digilocker for the years 2019-2022 for HSLC & HSSLC Marksheets (Legacy data for the other years will be added soon). Students (or any person) can get registered in the DigiLocker portal after giving their details and fetch e-documents such as Aadhaar, Pancard, Marksheets, etc. The Board is in the process of adding legacy data for other years as well.

9. Answer script & Result preparation

- a) Board introduced OMR sheet in the front page of its answer script for HSLC and HSSLC examinations in 2016 and 2017 respectively, to capture the details of the students.
- b) Answer scripts are scanned in the Fire-Eye scanner.
- c) During evaluation, OMR Award sheets are used by the examiners to record the marks.
- d) Result preparation is done in-house.
- e) Results of HSLC & HSSLC examination are digitised in the NBSE portal for the last three years.
- f) Students of HSLC & HSSLC can download their provisional mark statement from the NBSE portal since 2020 Examination.

10. Other best practices:

a. Paperless communication:

Since 2020 the Board has done away with the issuing of printed circulars to all the schools.

- a) All notifications & circulars are made available in the portal (2020 till date).
- b) Syllabus, Blueprint of question papers, model question papers and old question papers are made available in the portal.
- c) Application form submission for students appearing Board Examinations (HSLC & HSSLC) are all processed through the portal.

b. Easier Communication:

- i. 24x7 helpdesk is available in the portal for any queries. Any person can create a ticket for any query & check the status of the ticket for response from the Board. The ticket is closed once response is given & issue resolved.
- ii. A chatbot is made available in the portal for the Specific Learning Disability(SLD). This is an interactive chatbot developed by the ChangeInkk trust foundation for persons/students with Specific Learning Disability.
- iii. Board's twitter/Facebook account have daily updates of Quotes/MCQs to promote the higher order thinking skills of students. Besides these, important notifications are uploaded.
- iv. District WhatsApp group of the Heads of Schools is created for faster communication with them. Circulars & notifications are instantaneously sent to the Heads of schools and work-related queries are responded.

c. Online student registration:

The Board issues PCR to schools for maintaining academic records of students from class I to XII. Data collection was a challenging task since preparation of examination materials on time is very essential for timely conduct of examinations. With the use of technology this is being overcomed.

For students from Class VIII onwards digitised forms are used for data collection. Since 2017, a common data collection software (NBSE offline Software) is distributed and used by all the registered schools for entry and submission of digital forms.

For the school based examinations (Class VIII, IX & XI promotion/final examinations) schools can generate results using the offline software and send the results using digitised forms. All digitised forms are made available in the offline software menu.

d. Distribution of question paper:

A challenging task of the Board used to be the distribution of printed question paper to all the registered schools for conduct of school based examination. The Board had done away with the distribution of hard copy by giving password protected soft copies in pendrive or CDs. Now, with the development of the Board's portal, registered schools can download OTP generated and password protected question papers from the portal.

- 1. **14th & 15th February 2023 for Class IX and 16th & 17th February 2023 for Class X**: Online Meeting for the teachers of Financial Literacy Course conducted by the Board in collaboration with the National Stock Exchange Academy Limited. The training dwelt on subjects ranging from Banking (both liabilities and assets), Investment, Insurance concepts, Finance and Accounts, Soft Skills and related behavioural science areas, Effective Communication, Motivation.
- 2. **21st February 2023**: Virtual Meeting for Centre Superintendents of HSLC & HSSLC Examination Centres 2023. The meeting was held to discuss the roles and responsibilities of the Centre Superintendents. Rules and regulations for conduct of examinations and examination related matters were discussed.
- 3. **28th April 2023**: Meeting with newly appointed Heads of Institutions appointed during 2022-2023, held at Platinum Hall, NBCC, Bayavü Hill, Kohima. Dr. Visakhonu Hibo, Principal, Japfü Christian College, Kigwema was the Resource person at the meeting. She shared on the topic- Expectation from the Heads of Institutions. Other presentations on Academic and Examinations Matters by Joint Secretary, NBSE and IT Matters and Interventions by Chief Co-ordinator IT, NBSE were made. Books on vocational subjects were distributed to schools for their library reference.

- 4. **6th June 2023**: Online Meeting with all Heads of Registered Institutions of the Board. Important issues concerning the schools, new examination reforms, and other impending issues were discussed.
- 20th June 2023 & 17th August 2023: Held Online Meeting with 12 (twelve) Heads of Institutions/Centre Superintendent to discuss important matters relating to conduct of Board Examinations. The meeting emphasised on conduct of examination with fairness,

to check any malpractices, and to adhere strictly to the rules and regulations of conduct of examinations as per the Board's Rule. It was also stressed upon the Centre Superintendents to see to the smooth and timely delivery of the answer scripts to the Post Office to be sent to the Board after every examination. For Kohima and Tseminyu the training was held at Red Cross Building, Kohima. For the other districts, the training was conducted online. The AEP is a joint initiative by the Ministry of Education (MoE), Department of School Education & Literacy and National AIDS Control Organization (NACO), Government of India, to equip every adolescent (Children between 10-19 years) with scientific information, knowledge and life skills, to protect themselves from HIV infection and manage their concerns pertaining to reproductive and sexual health. AEP covers all the secondary and higher secondary schools of the country.
- 10th October 2023: Two hour online training programme on School Leadership for 7. Inclusive Education for all Heads of Institutions. The training covered topics on Inclusion and Inclusive Education from a school leader's perspective. Ummeed Child Development Centre (Ummeed CDC) and Keystone Education Society collaboratively were the resource agencies for the session. A total of 407 heads of Institutions participated in the training programme.

5. INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS

As per The Nagaland Board of School Education Act 1973, the Board grants permission and registers schools within the State to start Classes IX to XII. As part of its duties, the Board accords recognition to private institutions which are granted after fulfilment of the Board's criteria.

In order to assess the quality and performance of the institutions and to maintain the academic standards of both the private and the government schools, the Board has been carrying out inspection of schools in all the districts at regular intervals.

During inspection of schools, the standard, facilities available and the overall functioning of the schools are checked and monitored in order to guarantee that the teaching environment is conducive for learning to take place. All the records pertaining to the schools are checked during such inspections. If any gaps are found, the Board makes it a point to communicate to the schools so that prompt remedial action can be taken by the schools.

Here, it is worth mentioning that some schools are functioning very well and the Board acknowledges the commitment and dedication put forth by them in nurturing a culture of learning and growth. Many schools have already installed CCTV facilities in the classrooms and different technological platforms are being utilised to help in the learning process.

Some years back, the Government schools lacked proper infrastructure and the required facilities but now, it is encouraging to see many Government schools with good infrastructure and facilities. Government schools have also made considerable academic improvement and produced good results in the examinations conducted by the Board.

It is also observed that many teachers particularly in the private sector are yet to be trained. This is one area where the Board feels immediate action must be taken. On the other hand, many Government teachers are trained and qualified. However, one distinguishing factor which is clearly visible between the Government and private teachers is their accountability to their profession.

Whenever a private school asks for upgradation, the Board makes it a point to visit the particular school before permission is granted. The Board carries out inspection even for introduction of new subjects.

During the 2020-21, regular inspection could not be carried out due to the pandemic, however, now the momentum has picked up again and a very good number of schools have already been visited.

In order to let the system grow, constant and effective monitoring is necessary as it helps identify the areas that require attention and allows for necessary interventions.
